<p>Why should we vaccinate children? Some children get very sick from coronavirus. COVID-19 is the #1 largest killer of children ages 5-19, and kids who have been hospitalized.</p> <p>Most children don't become as sick as adults, but they can still spread it. COVID-19 vaccines prevent grandparent, sibling, sibling, and other household infections, hospitalizations, or death from severe cases of the virus.</p> <p>Getting into vaccinated helps prevent outbreaks that cause school closures.</p> <p>Is the vaccine safe for children? Yes! In 4,200 children aged 6 months to 11 years, the vaccine was safe and effective, preventing severe cases of the virus. Kids from COVID-19 greatly outweigh any potential risks from the vaccine.</p> <p>How do we keep children under five years old safe? Currently, there is not an approved COVID-19 vaccine for children under 5 years old. But you can protect children from being infected and spreading the virus to others.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Ensure all household members aged 16+ are vaccinated. • Breastfeeding moms can get vaccinated to help pass antibodies to their baby. • Encourage babies wearing swaddles and social distancing to minimize any risk in the household. • Wash hands. • Look for updates on whether a vaccine will become available for young children. <p>HOW CAN I GET MY CHILD A COVID-19 VACCINE?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Contact your local health department to make an appointment or ask them where mobile vaccine sites are located. • Contact your local community health center to make an appointment. • Ask your child's pediatrician if they offer COVID-19 vaccines. • Check with your local pharmacy. They will likely offer vaccines. • Speak with your child's school about getting a COVID-19 vaccine. They may offer on-site vaccine clinics. • In some places, parents are required to be present when their child is vaccinated. <p>Is the vaccine safe for me and my baby? What has changed over time?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Early in the pandemic, we didn't know the effects of the vaccine on pregnant women and their babies. • Now, we have lots of data, and we can confidently say: the COVID-19 vaccines are very safe for you and your baby! • As of late August 2021, more than 238,000 pregnant women have been vaccinated against COVID-19. • There have been no reports of any increased risk of pregnancy loss, growth problems, or birth defects. • COVID-19 vaccines are not live vaccines, and pregnant women and their babies cannot get COVID-19 from the vaccine. <p>In fact, the real risk is when a pregnant woman chooses NOT to get vaccinated.</p> <p>Women who become ill with COVID-19 during pregnancy:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Are 3 times more likely to need ICU care • Are 2 to 3 times more likely to need advanced life support and a breathing tube • Have a small increased risk of dying from COVID-19 • Are at an increased risk of having a stillbirth and preterm birth <p>HOW DO I GET A COVID-19 VACCINE?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Contact your local health department to make an appointment or ask them where mobile vaccine clinics are located. • Talk to your OB/GYN. • Check with your local pharmacy. They will likely offer vaccines. • Contact your local community health center to make an appointment. • Speak with your employer about getting a COVID-19 vaccine. 
